Dublin SafePort

Mutual Aid Group – Oil & HNS Response Program is a collaborative initiative bringing together 15 key stakeholders across the Dublin Port Estate. This program promotes shared responsibility for responding to Oil and Hazardous Noxious Substance (HNS) spills, ensuring a unified and effective approach. Now in its second year, the group has established a dedicated building for response equipment and implemented

training sessions to enhance the skills of personnel involved in cleanup operations. This initiative underscores the commitment to environmental protection and collective safety within Dublin Port.

Dublin Port Pass

The Dublin Port Pass ensures all personnel accessing the port are equipped with essential health, safety, and security knowledge.

The Dublin Port Pass is a mandatory Health & Safety and Security induction introduced by Dublin Port Company to ensure safe and secure access to the North and South Port Common User Areas.



Accessible in multiple languages—English, Irish, Filipino, Polish, Romanian, and Russian—the Dublin Port Pass is required for Port Employees, Tenants, Agents, Stevedores, Linesmen, Contractors, Suppliers, Drivers, and Visitors.

For seafarers, Dublin Port is committed to supporting safety and shore leave rights. Seafarers can complete a Dublin Port Pass or use a Shore Pass, detailed at Dublin Port Pass for Seafarers.

A separate safety induction is required for access to the Oil Zone; those needing entry should liaise with their agent or the Oil Zone Fire Wardens.

Basic Safety Rules for the Port, Quays and Terminals



Keep 1.5m back from quay wall at all times. Think water safety.



Be aware of lifting operations and moving machinery. Keep well clear.



Hi-visibility clothing must be worn.



Always use walkways provided.




Smoking in designated areas. No littering.
